The aim is to draw actionable insights for enhancing the leadership and effectiveness of vice principals in Uzbekistan's general education system. The study also recommends key focus areas to improve educational outcomes and institutional performance, supported by scholarly and governmental sources.

This thesis explores the vice principal's role in four national contexts—Uzbekistan, China, Finland, and Singapore—with a focus on duties, structural authority, and contributions to systemic improvement. Through comparison, it seeks to inform reforms and capacity-building strategies in Uzbekistan.

THE ROLE OF VICE PRINCIPALS FOR EDUCATIONAL AFFAIRS IN UZBEKISTAN

In Uzbekistan, Vice Principals for Educational Affairs are typically appointed by local education authorities based on recommendations from school directors. Their primary function is administrative and

methodological: managing lesson schedules, supervising academic planning, monitoring teacher performance, and organizing methodological training. Although they are central to day-to-day operations, their ability to initiate systemic improvements or innovate pedagogically is limited by rigid bureaucratic structures.

Key responsibilities include:

- Ensuring compliance with curriculum and regulatory standards
- Supervising teacher lesson plans and classroom delivery
- Coordinating assessments and examinations
- Leading teacher associations and development workshops

VICE PRINCIPAL ROLES IN DEVELOPED COUNTRIES

In China, the role of vice principals is diverse and aligned closely with national education priorities. Often, vice principals oversee academics, discipline, and policy implementation. Although Chinese schools are under provincial and local education bureaus, vice principals play a major role in aligning schools with centrally defined standards.

- Mixed levels of innovation depending on local leadership autonomy
- Finland’s decentralized education system empowers school leaders. Deputy principals in Finland are often facilitators of teacher autonomy and student-centered learning rather than enforcers of regulations.
